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PROTECTS THE PUBLIC

The Ontario College of Pharmacists regulates pharmacies and pharmacy professionals in Ontario. Our mandate is to protect and serve the public and we do this by building on a long-standing commitment of putting patients first and by collaborating with stakeholders to achieve the goal of quality and safe pharmacy services in the province.





1. Oversee Registration, Licensing and Accreditation

Ensure that only pharmacists and pharmacy technicians who meet all of the qualification requirements are granted a certificate of registration and are licensed to practice pharmacy. And ensure that community and hospital pharmacies meet quality and safety criteria in order to be accredited and authorized to operate in the province.



2. Establish Quality and Safety Standards

We develop standards, policies, guidelines and programs aimed at promoting the quality and safety of pharmacy practice.



3. Conduct Pharmacy Assessments

Assess pharmacies regularly to ensure compliance with established standards and to support continuous quality improvement.



4. Promote Continued Competency

Ensure pharmacy professionals maintain their skills throughout their careers through a quality assurance program which includes practice assessments.



5. Manage Concerns from the Public

Manage the complaints resolution process related to pharmacists, pharmacy technicians and pharmacies.



6. Communicate with the Public

Provide information to the public on what they can expect from their pharmacy experience and make relevant information about pharmacies and pharmacy professionals available through our public register.
