The College would examine if the workforce is sufficiently stable in order to ensure that access to care is no longer threatened or impacted. For example, in the current COVID-19 emergency, if all of the registration assessments are available through alternative measures and the backlog of new graduates is being addressed, such that graduates can register for the "full" certificate, then the influx of new graduates may be sufficient to stabilize the workforce and there would be no need for further extensions, even if we are still in a pandemic situation. The authority for the Registrar to renew these certificates is consistent with existing instances in the registration regulation where the authority to satisfy requirerments lies with the Registrar. Having this power sit with the Registrar, provides a nimble approach as needed for emergency situations.
