Programmatic Review PEBC initiated a comprehensive programmatic review in 2021 led by independent consultants to: determine the currency and relevance of PEBC's certification processes, determine whether PEBC's certification processes are effective in determining the competence of candidates at entry-topractice, identify any gaps or deficiencies in the certification processes and propose enhancements Multiple Choice Examination [Pharmacy Technician Qualifying Examination Part I (MCQ)] PEBC continued to offer remote proctoring for all of its multiple-choice examinations as an additional testing modality alongside with the use of Canadian and international (in-person) test centres. All candidates intending to take the exam were able to do so in 2021. Furthermore, PEBC evaluated multiple administrations to confirm that the choice of testing modality did not impact candidate performance or pass/fail results. Performance Examinations [Pharmacy Technician Qualifying Examination Part II (OSPE)] PEBC continued to prioritize the administration of in-person performance examinations under strict health and safety protocols to ensure the wellness of exam participants (candidates and exam personnel). By the end of 2021, the backlog of candidates was essentially eliminated.

Jurisprudence Exam The Jurisprudence exam is offered as a computer-based test (CBT) in select test centres in Canada and online by remote proctor with capacity for candidates maintained with changing covid restrictions. Candidates were able to test even in light of lockdowns or public health measures that affected capacity in test centres. Candidate surveys conducted in 2021 to evaluate user experience confirmed improved exam accessibility and availability and fully supported the testing platform. Online remote proctored exams allowed eligible candidates to access the exam from anywhere in the world if they had secure reliable internet access and required technology. Testing accommodations were streamlined for simple requests with the vendor's pre-approved list of personal items that previously required a case-by-case review and approval. Exam scoring processes were improved while maintaining validity to provide candidates with results earlier within 3 to 4 weeks (from within 5 to 6 weeks) of an exam.

This move follows government approval of regulatory amendments to General Regulation 202/94 under the Pharmacy Act, that were submitted to the Ministry of Health by the College in January, that enable the creation of an emergency assignment registration certificate class of pharmacy professionals.

RISK: Bridging Education Bridging education is a non-exemptible registration requirement for International Pharmacy Technician Applicants (IPTA) complete bridging education. In 2021, there were a number of International Pharmacy Technician Applicants coming forward that required a bridging program. Since the previous national program was discontinued, we needed another option. MITIGATION MEASURE: To mitigate this risk, an interim solution to allow International Pharmacy Technician Applicants to submit an application to a Panel for consideration of bridging education courses.
